

ABOUT

The Kansas Roads Scholar Program is a professional and skills development program of the Kansas County Highway Association (KCHA) and the Kansas Chapter of the American Public Works Association (APWA), with support from the following partners: Kansas Local Technical Assistance Program (LTAP), Kansas Department of Transportation (KDOT), the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA), and Kansas Association of Counties (KAC).

The program offers 28 required courses with 8 electives for around 200 hours of instruction to promote a skilled workforce for Kansas public works agencies. It is designed to increase knowledge of road and bridge management and maintenance procedures and improve technical, supervisory, and managerial skills. The courses are designed to be affordable for local agencies in Kansas.

PARTICIPATE

Any Kansas public works employee is invited to participate.

CERTIFY

Currently, each certificate states that the participant attended the required courses. However, Kansas LTAP is working towards tying certification to knowledge checks. These checks will verify a participant's understanding of the material.

CERTIFICATES

The Program has three levels and a free "Safety Star" program, detailed on the next page. The list of courses required for each certificate is developed by a committee of Kansas Public Works professionals. The courses are designed to give a comprehensive overview of the level's specific area of expertise.

A certificate is awarded to an individual who participates in all required courses for that level within 6 years of the date of enrollment. Courses completed 3 years prior to enrollment can be grandfathered in. A person can be enrolled for more than one level at the same time, if desired. Courses may be taken in any order, at any time. In general, a certificate must be earned for the preceding level in order to obtain a certificate at the next level.

APPLY

It's easy. Complete the application form and pay a one-time nonrefundable application fee of \$35 (required for levels I-III).The fee provides funds to monitor student progress. Enroll online or download an application at: https://kutc.ku.edu/kansas-roads-

COURSES

TRACKING

Kansas LTAP tracks attendance in and reports participant completions to KCHA and APWA for program recognition. Roads Scholar participants and their training managers can access course records through their accounts on the learning management system.

HOW MUCH TO BUDGET FOR ROADS SCHOLAR TRAINING



Are you interested in enrolling your staff members in the Kansas Roads Scholar Program but want to know how much it will cost? Here is your answer. The cost for taking Roads Scholar classes depends on which entity is teaching a particular course (LTAP, KAC, or TASK). The rate for program expenses for the Level One Roads Scholar is around \$700, Level Two around \$700, and Level Three around \$980. Registration fees cover instruction, materials and lunch (for LTAP and KAC classes). Note: There is a time limit of six years to complete each level from the date of application. KCAMP DISCOUNT

KCAMP Discount Members of the Kansas County Association Multiline Pool (KCAMP) are eligible for tuition reimbursement for Roads Scholar classes. KCAMP sets aside funds each year (based on member's annual contribution) from which they can reimburse up to \$50 per person for each Roads Scholar class taken. Students do not need to be enrolled in any level of the Roads Scholar Program to qualify. Master Roads Scholar recognition is awarded to individuals who have either: 1) completed Levels One and Two of the Roads Scholar Program and the courses listed above; or 2) have 5 years of experience in public works administration and have completed Level Two and the courses listed above in the required 6-year time period. Levels Two and Three may be taken simultaneously.



SAFETY STAR PROGRAM

Enhances the knowledge of safety related basics. This program is intended for City Street Superintendents and County Road Supervisors, but also includes any public works individuals that are interested in safety. The program has no prerequisites or fee and all students housed in our learning management system are automatically enrolled.
